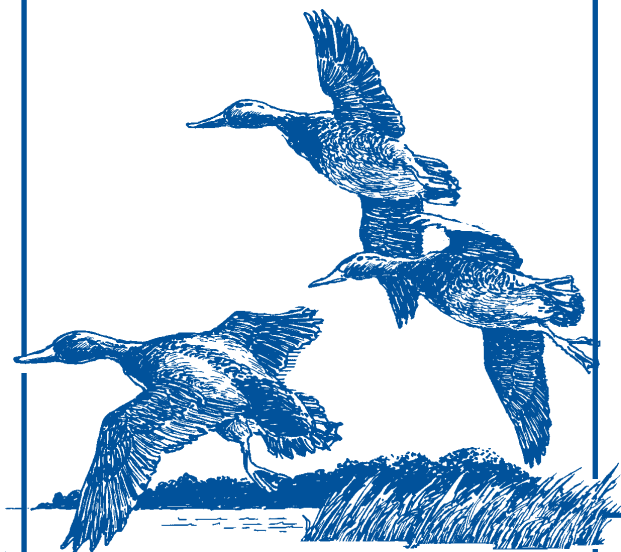

TC 86 - Length, 1 hour 30 minutes

Forest Stewardship: Conserving Our Forests

Winner: Landmark Achievement for Outstanding Forestry Communications, presented by the National Woodland Owners Association.

The 1990 Farm Bill established the Forest Stewardship Program to encourage and promote managing forest lands in an environmentally sensitive manner. The goal is for private landowners to maximize their enjoyment of the land, while maintaining its future value. This program shows, through showcase examples, how forest stewardship is being practiced in Alabama, Oklahoma, Minnesota, and North Carolina. It also provides information on the Stewardship Incentives Program.

TC 125 - Length, 1 hour 30 minutes

Managing Forest Ecosystems: Assessing New Opportunities

This video involves nonindustrial private forest landowners in the current discussion and debate focused on the ecosystem management approach to managing the nation's forest resources. Through showcase studies videotaped in Connecticut, Minnesota, and Oregon, this program shows how the ecosystem management approach is being carried out across the nation on a voluntary, non-regulatory basis. Also examined are the concepts of what is an ecosystem, biodiversity, forest health, sustainability, and policy implications. Specific suggestions for how private landowners can practice ecosystem management are offered.

TC 146 - Length, 1 hour 45 minutes

Managing for a Hunting Lease Operation

Lease hunting, or "fee hunting," is becoming increasingly popular. This video, produced jointly by the Texas and Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Services, examines lease hunting operations in the Texas hill country, known for its tradition of hunting leases, and in various parts of Oklahoma. Topics covered include economic potential, management strategies, marketing plans and liability coverage.

Catfish Fee Fishing Operations

Using existing businesses as examples, this video discusses all phases of a fee fishing business. If you are interested in opening a catfish fee fishing operation, this video will show you the steps involved.

Using Prescribed Fire in Oklahoma

When used properly, controlled burns can improve grazing for cattle, restore prairies and forests, and improve habitats for wildlife. Learn the methods for conducting a controlled burn by watching as OSU Extension specialists conduct successful controlled burns in several locations.
